

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

History of "Saint John's" and "Granville Parish" Granville County, NC (by Mrs. Charlotte Britt Hobbs, 1931)

In the year 1663, Charles II, King of England, granted to Sir George Carteret, and seven other English noblemen, a Charter, for the Carolinas, which were named for the King.

In 1729, all of them except the Earl of Granville, descendent of Sir George Carteret, sold their Charters to the King of England. He was asked where he would take his share, and he replied, next to the Virginia line. Consequently one eighth part next to the Virginia line was reserved for the Earl of Granville, by a line running 25 degrees and 34 minutes South, leaving land between this line, and Virginia on the North, to the Atlantic Ocean on the East and the Pacific Ocean on the West, for this princely possession.

This territory was first Craven County, but by act of the North Carolina Assembly in 1733, Edgecombe County was formed. Again in 1746 the Assembly took from Edgecombe County, the west portion, which was named Granville County, and "Saint John's Parish", the former in honor of the proprietor of the soil. It was further enacted by the same Assembly, that William EATON, William PERSONS, John MARTIN, Edward JONES, James MITCHELL, James PAYNE, West HARRIS, John WADE, William MOORE, Samuel LANIER, Robert PARKER, and Joseph SIMMS be appointed Vestrymen to serve "Saint John's Parish" until the general election of Vestrymen according to law.

These vestrymen to be summoned by the Sheriff of Granville County to meet at the house of William EASON and qualify themselves as a vestry, and proceed to the Parish business.

The General Assembly in 1758 divided the Parish of "Saint John's" into two distinct Parishes, the dividing line beginning at Cotton Creek, where the Virginia line crosses the same, thence running South thirty degrees West to the Johnson County line. All the part of Saint John's Parish lying west of that line shall be called Granville Parish. Robert HARRIS, Richard HENDERSON, Ruben SEARCY, Henry HOWARD, Richard HARRIS, Jr., James MITCHELL, Andrew HAMPTON, Thomas LOWE (?), Evan RAGLAND, William BENFORD, Darian KLWICK, (?) and Sherwood HARRIS, were appointed Vestrymen for this Parish of Granville.

The same act provides for the purchase of Glebe land in every Parish in the Province for the use of ministers officiating in the Parish.

As early as 1749 the Reverend Clement **HALL**, a Missionary of the Society for Propagation of the Gospel, reports a long missionary journey from Edenton to Granville County. There he preached seven times, churched fifty women, and baptized 184 children. The spiritual state of the men he did not mention.

Another record of 1769 states that Governor **TRYON** settled the Reverend Mr. **McCARTNEY** as the minister for Granville County. A few months afterwards, the Missionary writes that he had been "cordially received by the people", and they still continued to make his life as agreeable as the situation of the place admits of.

Saint John's Church at Williamsboro is believed to have been built prior to the time that Saint John's Parish and Granville Parish were divided, therefore it was first in Saint John's Parish, and it is reasonable to believe that it was built prior to 1758. Tradition says that it was built as early as 1754, and the Brick in the church at that time was brought from England wrapped in tissue paper, and that a church organization was in existence there as early as 1747. The Church was first built one half mile from where the present building now stands, having been removed to the present location, upon ground given by Judge John WILLIAMS although there seems to be no deed recording this act.

The first reference to the Williamsboro Church obtainable is in a deed from Judge John WILLIAMS, to his son-in-law, Robert BURTON, in which he mentions the tract of land conveyed; the reference to the Church is this. "Except two acres of land whereon the Church now stands, as heretofore laid off for use of said Church." This deed bears the date July 7th, 1779, and is recorded in Book "O" in the office of the Register of Deeds of Granville County.

When the town of Williamsboro was laid out in 1786, the Church lands seemed to be reduced to one acre, according to the records. No doubt the Reverend McCARTNEY appointed by Governor Tryon preached some times at this Church.

St. John Church, Williamsboro, is the oldest Episcopal Church of the Diocese still in service, and it seems to have been the "Cathedral City" so to speak, of Saint John's Parish, and later "Granville Parish". It was here that the first Bishop of the Diocese, Right Rev. John Stark RAVENCROFT lived and preached. The house in which he lived is still in good repair (1931), standing some 200 yards West of the Church. A picture of the Bishop hangs on the wall of the Vestry room of the Church, and an old Windsor chair, with an arm for writing, reputed to have been used by him when he preached there. We have in Oxford an old brass kettle, once the property of Bishop RAVENCROFT, now owned by Mr. And Mrs. T. LANIER handed down to them by their common ancestor, Dr. J. R. HICKS.

Bishop RAVENCROFT'S second wife, Sarah BUFORD, born February 1784, died January 15th, 1829, is buried in the Churchyard Cemetery near the rear end of the church, but the Bishop was removed from there, to be reinterred under the Chancel of Christ Church, Raleigh, N.C.

By references and deeds in the Granville County Court House, we find the following churches contemporary with Saint John's Church, Williamsboro: "Trinity Church", Pleasant Springs, October 1755, by deed from Ben WARD to Saint John's Parrish, "Saint Michael" Church, Book "D", page 94, June 24, 1760, in Granville County, now Warren County, in the vicinity of Gideon MACON'S land. "Saint George Chapel", in Harrisburg, reference Book F, Page 402, 1763, also Book I, Page 24, 1769. A further reference to "Saint George Chapel", Harrisburg was made.

In 1759, Ruben SEARCY, and Richard HENDERSON, Church Wardens for Saint John's Chapel, purchased from Robert HARRIS, 400 acres of land, (now about five miles from Oxford), for the use of the ministers of Saint George Chapel. This land is on the road leading from COZART'S Mill to Dabney, on what was known long ago, as the old "Indian Trading Path".

The Glebe land had its beginning on Poplar Creek, and extended from there to the east prong of Tabs Creek, and embraced the tract of land long owned and occupied by Mr. E. T. CREWS, an

uncle of Mr. A. A. HICKS, who repaired and added to the old house known as the Parish House, or Parsonage for Saint Georges Chapel. The road which ran through the church land was known as the Glebe Road, from that time until now. "Banks Chapel", in the vicinity of Wilton. No deed for the church land was found, but it is supposed to have been given by a planter, Mr. Thomas BANKS, from Georgia, who bought a large tract of land about Wilton. As a devoted son of the Church of England, he at once established the Church there.

Although no deed to the church land has been found, many references to it are made in transfers of land surrounding the Church or Chapel. At the outbreak of the Revolutionary War, the Rector was forcibly thrown out of this church for his loyalist opinions. After the War, the Methodists possessed the church, and it is continued under the name of Bank's Chapel. Some of the ancestors of Oxford's families are buried in the Churchyard.

In a list of the Clergy of the Diocese, made in 1794 by Reverend Charles B. **PETTIGREW**, who was chosen first Bishop of North Carolina, but who died before he could be consecrated, occurs the name of Reverend George **MICKLEJOHN**, of Granville County. He doubtless preached at Saint John's, Williamsboro, and perhaps visited Oxford, and preached. This is mere conjecture, as there is no record of such.

Oxford was at this time known as Post Town, then Merrittsville, later Oxford. The records of the church are meager at this time, and we have no further mention of them until the "Presbyterian Record Book", which says (1812-17) that religious bodies held services in the vicinity, and perhaps our church was among those bodies.

In the Court House records, we find this entry concerning the town of Oxford. "The commissioners, having advertised as the law directs, did on the 7th and 8th days of May in the year 1812, dispose of lots on a credit, until the 20th of April, 1813, except lot No. 21, which they have reserved for the purpose of putting a church or meeting house on, having now on it a number of graves". Signed – Robert BURTON, Charles EATON, John HARE, Robert JESTER, and Ben HILLIYARD, commissioners. This record has direct bearing on the history of Saint Stephen's Church, Oxford, because the present building stands on part of said Lot No. 21, reserved in this sale of land.

The Diocese of North Caroling was formed in 1801, and to the present day has had five Bishops. Right Reverend John Stark RAVENCROFT, Right Reverend Levi Stilliman IVES, Right Reverend Thomas ATKINSON, Right Reverend Theodore B. LYMAN, Right Reverend Joseph Blount CHESHIRE D. D., Right Reverend Edwin A. PENICK, Bishop Co-Adjutors (?).

In a journal of 1819, the following entry was made. "The Episcopal congregation in the town of Williamsboro was regularly admitted into union with the convention, whereupon Mr. William GREEN appeared as a lay delegate and took his seat." A Mr. Lewis GREEN (page missing) siderable excitement was manifested by some of the Methodist persuasion, I consider the prospects of the Church unpromising, though not hopeless.

We hear no more of Saint Stephen's Church, Oxford, until the spring of 1832. Then at a meeting of the congregation steps were taken to build a church. Dr. James RIDLEY, Robert KYLE (buried in Churchyard), Rhodes HERNDON, Lewis GREEN, T. D. RIDLEY, William M.

SNEED, John C. TAYLOR, Augustin LANDIS, and James A. RUSSELL were appointed Vestryman.

In April, 1832, Robert KYLE, William RIDLEY, S. O'BRIAN and Rhodes HERNDON were appointed to enquire into the propriety of building a church, into the probable cost, the prospects of raising the funds and securing a suitable sight. Messrs. Robert KYLE, James RUSSELL and Russell KINGSBURY were appointed a building committee. The lot was purchased by William SNEED (being part of the original Lot 21, Town of Oxford), for \$200.00, and the church built by Edward ALLEN for \$800.00. Bishop IVES laid the corner stone November 27th, 1832. Reverend William SHAW took charge of Oxford and Williamsboro December 1st, 1832. The Church was completed and consecrated April 20th, 1833.

June 8, 1834, Reverend T. S. W. MOTT, Rector, records, "The state of the Parish has from the time of its commencement been uncommonly prosperous. In the course of three years it has risen from nothing to a highly respectable rank among our country congregation. It is free of all debt, has a neat church completed and paid for, a good bell, and as large share of male communicants in prorprtion (?) to its number as any other Church in the State".

In July 31st, 1841, Reverend Lewis **TAYLOR**, Rector, April 18th, 1842 Convention of the Diocese met in Saint Stephen's, Oxford. Reverend Lewis **TAYLOR** resigned March 20, 1844. He is buried in the churchyard.

In 1849 the Diocese was in great distress in regard to the preverson of Bishop IVES to the Roman Church. An interesting account of which is found in the records of Saint Stephen's Church.

Saint James' Church, built in 1838 or 1839, a deed calls for Dennis T. PASCHALL to vestry of Saint James' Church, Dr. Edward SPEED, Daniel T. PASCHALL, Lunsford A. PASCHALL and Donald PASCHALL, trustees and vestrymen of Saint James' Church. Said land lying in the country, through which the public road leading from FLOYD's shop on the Taylor road, (Raleigh Road), to Wilson DIAMOND's house on the Dickerson road, 210 feet, running back from road 210 feet front. Mr. And Mrs. R. J. MITCHELL were married in this church, 1852, my grandfather and grandmother.

There seems to have been a church at "Kittrell Springs", near this date, but I cannot find any records of same. It may be the same church that is in the village of Kittrell now.

A deed dated 1843 – Lewis **REAVIS** to H. I. **ROBARDS**, all for land on which the first Episcopal Church in Henderson was built. The land fronted on Garnet Street, and is the main street in Henderson. The present church, Holy Innocence, is located on Chestnut Street. Reverend J. E. **INGLE** was rector there for many years. The Reverend I. W. **HUGHES** is the Rector at present (1931). This church was lost to Granville County when Vance County was formed in 1881.

In 1854, during the rectorship of Reverend R. B. SUTTON of Baltimore, steps were taken and money raised to enlarge and improve the Church. Messrs. L. A. PASCHALL, James T. LITTLEJOHN, and R. H. KINGSBURY were the building committee. About \$500.00 was spent for this purpose, and in July, the church was re-dedicated by Bishop ATKINSON. Dr.

SUTTON, in addition to his duties as Rector of Saint Stephen's, Oxford, and Saint Paul's, Louisburg, started a Mission in Graham where a church has since been built.

July 23, 1859, Reverend E. W. GILLIAM became Rector. He gave half of his time to Oxford, and one half to mission work in the county. He resigned in 1860 to accept a call to Leaksville.

December 1860, Reverend J. B. CALHOUN, who in the spring of 1865 resigned and moved to Maryland, was a refugee to this town. After I was married and moved to Rutherford, N.J., I met and knew two of his sons and their families well. Dr. J. B. CALHOUN, the younger of these two men, was born in Oxford.

August 6th, 1863, Reverend M. H. VAUGHN was called to take charge at a salary of \$800.00. In the year 1867 or 1868, the Rectory was purchased and title made to the Vestry. He was rector during the Civil War, and I find from the records that a number of refugee communicants nearly equaled the regular communicants of the Parish. Some of these people remained, others were removed from the church book after the war. Mrs. Hannah PENNIX returned to Oxford many years later to make her home in Oxford. She was Miss Hannah BAXTER. Reverend M. H. VAUGHN resigned and went to Elizabeth City.

February 7th, 1871, Reverend P. D. **THOMPSON** was called to Saint Stephen's, Oxford, and also took charge of the church at Goshen, Saint Paul's, which was given and built by Miss Lucy J. **THORPE**, not far from her home, in 1873. An interesting story is told of this home place, Goshen. It was here that Lord **CORNWALLIS** mobilized his troops, and earthen breast works were thrown up to protect the English from their enemies. This mound of earth can be seen in the garden back of the house at the present time. Miss Lucy **THORPE** left this home place, Goshen and the church, Saint Paul's in her will of 1891 to the Diocese of North Carolina, but the Trustees of the Diocese felt that 500 acres of land was too much to cultivate, so that part of Miss **THORPE**'s will was sold to Mr. Peterson **THORPE**, her kinsman.

On November 28th, 1875, Reverend VAUGHN again became Rector of Saint Stephen's, and took charge also of congregations at Stovall (Sassafras Fork) and Goshen.

In 1877, Mr. and Mrs. N. A. GREGORY, M. A. (Toody) GREGORY, Mr. A. H. GREGORY, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert GREGORY, Mr. and Mrs. R. C. GREGORY, Misses Nannie and Martha GREGORY (Mrs. N. M. FEREBEE), Dr. and Mrs. F. R. GREGORY, Mr. and Mrs. C. A. GREGORY, bought land from Mr. J. W. STOVALL, and built a small church. This was abandoned, and in 1879, Saint Peter's, Stovall, was built on land purchased from Mr. Richard HARRIS. Recently, a small organ has been installed by Mrs. Ella GREGORY, in memory of her son, Mr. Herbert GREGORY.* (*About 1906, Sam CURRIN became a member of this church, the first member not a GREGORY it was said. F.B.H., 1936.)

Until about 25 years ago, when Mr. Sam CURRIN became a member of this church, he was the first person, other than a GREGORY, to belong to this church. We have some record of a small church at Fairport, sponsored by the families surrounding it. The PEACEs, WILLIAMS, Spottswood BURWELL, and CAPEHARTS. This church did not endure for many years, and was finally abandoned. There may be other Churches in the Granville Parish, and present Granville County, but I have been unable to find them.

In March 9th, 1879, the Rector and vestry of St. Stephens, Oxford, signed testimonials recommending Reverend Benjamin S. LASSITER as a suitable person to be ordained to the priesthood, also recommending Junius Moore HORNER as a suitable person to be ordained for Holy Orders.

In 1879, at Whitsuntide, a vote of thanks was tendered Mr. F. A. FETTER for his faithfulness as a lay reader of the Parish. Mr. FETTER taught in Oxford for a number of years, after that he became a clergyman. There were also resolutions of respect to the memory of Lunsford A. PASCHALL, who had been Senior Warden for 19 years. Mr. Edward HICKS was elected Junior Warden.

In 1881 the Bell was bought and placed in the church at a cost of \$197.94.

In 1884, spring or early summer, Reverend James BAIRD, D. D., of New York, during his rectorship the organ was bought, the gallery was built, and the recess chancel and room for the organ.

In 1885, Reverend L. W. ROSE became Rector. He reported that the Parish had suffered severely from frequent changes of Rectors, but now gave evidence of being in a prosperous condition. He resigned in 1887.

Mr. W. WALKER succeeded Reverend L. W. ROSE, January 1st, 1888, and the Bishop wrote: "The prospects for the growth of the church are brighter. The subject of a new church was agitated during Mr. WALKER's rectorship, and a committee of two was appointed to negotiate the purchase of the corner lot, next to the church. Reverend WALKER resigned in November 1892, while matters in regard to the new church were still unsettled.

Reverend Edward BENEDICT came to the church as Rector January 1st, 1895. During his rectorship, plans for the new church were drawn by Mr. Silas McBEE of New York, and accepted. A building committee consisting of Messrs. J. C. HORNER, J. G. HALL, and R. W. LASSITER, was appointed. The corner lot next to the church was bought, for \$1250.00 and the church property was improved and enlarged. During the Rectorship of Reverend James F. PLUMMER, 1895-1897. The foundation for the new church was made, and the walls finally erected as far as the top of the windows.

The Reverend Robert Bruce **OWEN**, came to the church as Rector, Christmas day, 1897. It was during his incumbency that the church was finally completed and dedicated, on Saint Barnabus' Day 1902, by the Right Reverend Joseph Blount **CHESHIRE**.

It was Mr. **OWEN** who erected and beautified the second Alter with loving skill, gave the Credence table as a memorial to his sister and built the Rood-Screen. The Church was first used for the wedding of Miss Carolyn **SKINNER** and Mr. Cameron **EASTON**, September 25, 1901, parents of one of the present vestrymen.

The church is in constant use and beloved by all of us who took part in the erection and maintaining of the same. Although the "male members", are the ones who appear as the most important, the women had a large share in the erection of this beautiful church.

From Oxford have gone out three clergymen and one Bishop, and two Missionaries, as follows: Reverend Lewis **TAYLOR**, pastor of our church July 1841-44, Reverend Benjamin S. **LASSITER**, who is still living, and Uncle of Mr. R. G. and B. K. **LASSITER**, vestrymen of the church. Rev. Lewis **TAYLOR**, Oxford, Bishop Junius **HORNER**, Bishop of the Western Diocese.

Miss Helen **HICKS**, Porto Rico, and Miss Mary E. **HORNER**, who in the latter years of her life, had charge of "Valla Crusis" mission school, in the Vicinity of Boone, North Carolina, until the time of her death. I cannot complete this paper without a tribute of love to her. She labored all of her life for the Master's kingdom, and from my early childhood it was she who instilled to a large degree, my knowledge of and love of our church.

A Christmas Pie

Make the walls of a thick standing crust, to any size you like and ornamented as fancy directs. Lay at the bottom of the pie a beef steak. Bone a turkey, goose, fowl, duck, partridge and place one over the other, so that when cut, the white and brown meat may appear alternately. Put a large tongue by its side, and fill the vacancies with forcemeat balls and hard eggs; then add savory jelly. This last is better for being kept in a mould and only taken out as required. Bacon, chopped or beat up with the forcemeat, is preferable to suet, as it is nicer when cold and keeps better.

Main Building at Horner School Burned

2nd in a series of 4

Loss is Heavy on the School. Building Was Insured For \$20,000. Boy Breaks Leg By Jumping From A Second Story Window.

Just as we are going to press the main building at the HORNER Military School is being burnt to the ground. From the best information at hand the fire started in the boiler room where the heat is made for the school, and when it was discovered at 12 p.m. it had gained such headway that the efforts of the fire companies were in vain, all they could do was to try to throw water on the other buildings nearby, as the water pressure was so weak that it could scarcely be made to reach the second story of the old barracks building.

The building, we learn, had \$20,000 insurance which will only partially cover the loss. The majority of the students lost all of their clothing and other things they had in their rooms. All the students had to leap from the windows of their rooms to save their lives. And it is reported that one boy had his leg broken, while all of them were badly shaken up. Of course clothing and shelter will be provided for the boys until other arrangements can be made by the generous people of Oxford who deplore the fact that this worthy school has come to so great a loss.

We cannot learn now as to whether the present session of school will be continued, but presume it will.


