

#### Some Old Oxford Families

Oxford Public Ledger, October 23, 1953

With a Few Historical and Genealogical Notes Concerning a Number of Their Members, Including Several References to the Youngest Generation.

#### Marsh and Ray Families

One need go no further back than 1924 to find a great-grandfather of Oxford people who are of the seventh generation from another former citizen of Oxford. Rev. Dr. Robert Henry MARSH died on September 29 of that year leaving a daughter, Mrs. Lizzie Marsh RAY, who was the mother of Robert Marsh RAY. This son is the father of Robert Marsh RAY Jr., whose children are of the fifth generation from Dr. MARSH. Through their mother these children are of the seventh generation from Dr. Samuel DUTY, but their DUTY ancestors, except Dr. and Mrs. DUTY, did not live in Oxford.

#### Some of Postmaster Jones' Descendants

Amos Terry Thorp **JONES** was postmaster of Oxford as early as 1856. Under carpetbag rule, he was disqualified for holding a federal office. Then first one daughter, Martha W. (1865-67), and another, Elizabeth (1867-72), held the office until their father was reinstated in 1872. No doubt Mr. **JONES** continued to do at least the greater part of the work as usual.

Another daughter of Mr. JONES' was Mary Jane, who married Charles CURRIN and was the mother of the Rev. Joseph B. CURRIN, of Person County, and of Mrs. Ruth CURRIN, of Oxford. Mrs. Ruth CURRIN'S grandchildren, the children of Samuel Booth CURRIN Jr., and of Mrs. Mildred Currin WHEELER, are of the fifth generation from Amos Terry Thorp JONES. They are also of the sixth generation from Dr. Samuel DUTY, through Harriet Atwood DUTY, who married Mr. JONES.

Still another daughter of Amos Terry Thorp JONES' was Alice Belle, who married John Edward CALLIS and was the grandmother of Frank Hays CALLIS, whose children are of the fifth generation from Oxford's former Postmaster JONES.

#### Turners and Joneses

William R. TURNER, who died in 1884, was a dealer in meats, as were his son Charles J. and Charles J.'s son Hubert. He was also a house mover and a mason. Charles J. TURNER had a daughter, Maude, who married Ernest T. JONES, and was the mother, among others, of Mrs. J. M. ROYSTER, Charles JONES and Brummitt JONES.

Charles **JONES** had a son Charles Jr., who has a baby which is of the sixth generation from William R. **TURNER**, while Brummitt **JONES**' child is of the fifth generation.

Thomas H. JONES, father of Ernest T. JONES, moved to Oxford from the Tally Ho section about 1879-80. His daughter Nannie married Lonnie SMITH and was the mother of Mrs. Daisy Smith MITCHELL, mother of William Leonard MITCHELL, father of children who are of the

fifth generation of Oxford people as mention in the paragraph about the elder William Leonard MITCHELL.

#### Hunt - White - Smith Families

When it comes to a matter of five generations occupying the same premises, there are several instances in Oxford.

James Thomas HUNT, an early chain-store magnate, owned and occupied the lot on which Mrs. Hixey White SMITH now lives as part owner. Mrs. SMITH'S mother, Mrs. Ida Hunt WHITE, owned and lived on the place and the SMITH children, who are of the fifth generation from James Thomas HUNT, have spent most of their lives there

#### Mrs. Allen an Ancestor of Many

An Oxford woman of an earlier age was Mrs. Emeline Henry ALLEN whose descendents are about if not quite as numerous as are those of Mrs. Ann Downey COOPER.

Mrs. ALLEN owned the MINOR place on College Street. Her daughter, Julia Brent ALLEN, married Richard Van Buren MINOR. This couple were the parents of Mrs. Hettie Minor HICKS, and Mrs. HICKS' daughter, Mrs. Julia Brent Hicks CRAWFORD, now lives on part of the old ALLEN place with her children, which children are of the fifth generation from Mrs. ALLEN.

Mrs. ALLEN has another daughter, Ellen, who married Amos Gooch CLEMENT. This couple were the parents of Mrs. Julia Brent Clement MEADOWS, mother of Mrs. Selena Meadows HANEY, mother of Lila Brent HANEY, who is of the fifth generation from Mrs. Emeline ALLEN.

Mrs. Julia Brent CLEMENT the late Edward A. MEADOWS, father of football star Edward A. MEADOWS. (Editor's note: This is exactly the way it was printed in this article.)

Another daughter of Mrs. Emeline ALLEN, Virginia, married W. Davis SMITH, whose son, Wade Hampton SMITH, married Lena HARRIS. This couple were the parents of Lella Bernard SMITH, who married Wilbur Lee VAUGHT and is the mother of Mary Caroline VAUGHT, of the fifth generation from Mrs. ALLEN.

The W. Davis SMITHS were also the parents of J. Graham SMITH, whose son, Robert Davis SMITH married Annella ATKINSON. Robert Davis SMITH Jr., is of the fifth generation from Mrs. ALLEN.

#### Spencer – Blacknall – Adams Families

Abram SPENCER came from Virginia when Oxford was young and lived with his family in the old house on McClanahan Street opposite the Community House. He was the father of Capt. Alexander Farrar SPENCER who commanded the Granville Grays in the Civil War after Capt. Augustus LANDIS was incapacitated by a wound.

The SPENCERS had a daughter, Virginia, who married Col. Charles C. BLACKNALL. Annie, a daughter of this couple married William A. ADAMS (whose name is preserved in the W.A. ADAMS Tobacco Company) and their son, William, married Susan WEBB, mother of two daughters who are of the fifth generation from Abram SPENCER.

#### The Horners of School Fame

Jerome Channing HORNER was a son of Dr. James Hunter HORNER, founder of the famous HORNER School. The son was father of Mrs. Eloise Horner JONES, and Mrs. JONES has a daughter, Mrs. Martha Kent Jones HAMME. The young daughter of the HAMMES is of the fifth generation from Dr. James H. HORNER.

Dr. **HORNER** was the great-great-grandfather of the Thomas Moore **EVINS** children, the entire five generations having lived or are living on the original **HORNER** premises. The **EVINS** children are also mentioned under Mrs. Ann Cooper **DOWNERY**.

#### Five Generations of Lassiters

Robert William LASSITER, father of Robert Walter LASSITER, was for eight years clerk of the superior court of Granville County. Benjamin Kittrell LASSITER'S daughter, Mrs. Letty Lassiter WILDER, is the mother of four children who are of the fifth generation from Robert William LASSITER.

David Alexander HUNT, elder brother of James Thomas HUNT, already mentioned, was a promient merchant of Oxford during the nineteenth century. He was father of William Henry HUNT and grandfather of Outlaw HUNT. Outlaw HUNT is the grandfather of the three children of Nancy Travis Hunt TAYLOR, making five generations.

#### Five Generations, All James Woods

James Madison WOOD lived on the site of the present MANGUM Warehouse, his cabinet shop being in a corner of his yard. He left a son, James Knight WOOD, who left a son, James Robert WOOD, who left a son James Robert WOOD Jr., whose children, including a James Robert WOOD, are of the fifth generation from James Madison WOOD.

# Clan Surnames In Scotland Tip World

In Scotland, it was a simple act of loyalty for a new member of a clan to accept the chief's name. A new member didn't necessarily have to be related by blood; he only had to swear allegiance to the clan. A clan isn't a family but an alliance of several families and, often, individuals. Finding many Campbells, Fergusons, MacLeods, or Munros in one area doesn't necessarily indicate blood kinship. The clans traditionally occupied the Highlands (the hilly areas of Scotland). The people of the Lowlands gained surnames in ways similar to those of the English (using occupational names and passing names from generation to generation). You should never assume that one clan member is related to another unless you have documented proof.

#### Life in the 1500's

Most people got married in June because they took their yearly bath in May and were still smelling pretty good by June. However, they were starting to smell, so brides carried a bouquet of flowers to hide the "B.O."....

Baths equaled a big tub filled with hot water. The man of the house had the privilege of the nice clean water, then all the other sons and men, then the women and finally the children. Last of all the babies. By then the water was so dirty you could actually lose someone in it. Hence the saying, "Don't throw the baby out with the bath water".....

Houses had thatched roofs. Thick straw, piled high, with no wood underneath. It was the only place for animals to get warm, so all the pets... dogs, cats and other small animals, mice, rats, bugs lived in the roof. When it rained it became slippery and sometimes the animals would slip and fall off the roof... Hence the saying, "It's raining cats and dogs."

There was nothing to stop things from falling into the house. This posed a real problem in the bedroom where bugs and other droppings could really mess up your nice clean bed. So, they found if they made beds with big posts and hung a sheet over the top, it addressed that problem. Hence those beautiful big 4 poster beds with canopies..... The floor was dirt. Only the wealthy had something other than dirt, hence the saying "dirt poor." The wealthy had slate floors, which would get slippery in the winter when wet. So they spread thresh on the floor to help keep their footing. As the winter wore on they kept adding more thresh until when you opened the door it would all start slipping outside. So, they placed a piece of wood at the entry way, hence a "thresh hold"......

They cooked in the kitchen in a big kettle that always hung over the fire. Every day they lit the fire and added things to the pot. They mostly ate vegetables and didn't get much meat. They would eat the stew for dinner leaving leftovers in the pot to get cold overnight and then start over the next day. Sometimes the stew had food in it that had been in there for a month. Hence the rhyme: peas porridge hot, peas porridge cold, peas porridge in the pot nine days old".....

Sometimes they could obtain pork and would feel really special when that happened. When company came over, they would bring out some bacon and hang it to show it off. It was a sign of wealth and that a man "could really bring home the bacon." They would cut off a little to share with guests and would all sit around and "chew the fat".....

Those with money had plates made of pewter. Food with high acid content caused some of the lead to leach onto the food. This happened most often with tomatoes, so they stopped eating tomatoes... for 400 years. Most people didn't have pewter plates, but had trenchers - a piece of wood with the middle scooped out like a bowl. Trenchers were never washed and a lot of times worms got into the wood. After eating off wormy trenchers, they would get "trench mouth"....

Bread was divided according to status. Workers got the burnt bottom of the loaf, the family got the middle, and guests got the top, or the "upper crust"....

Lead cups were used to drink ale or whiskey. The combination would sometimes knock them out for a couple of days. Someone walking along the road would take them for dead and prepare them for burial. They were laid out on the kitchen table for a couple of days and the family would gather around and eat and drink and wait and see if they would wake up. Hence the custom of holding a "wake"....

England is old and small, and they started running out of places to bury people. So, they would dig up coffins and would take their bones to a house and reuse the grave. In reopening these coffins, one out of 25 coffins were found to have scratch marks on the inside and they realized they had been burying people alive. So they thought they would tie a string on their wrist and lead it through the coffin and up through the ground and tie it to a bell. Someone would have to sit out in the graveyard all night to listen for the bell. Hence on the "graveyard shift" they would know that someone was "saved by the bell" or he was a "dead ringer"....

# A True Copy of John Penn's Last Will and Testament

Public Ledger, March 10, 1925

On File in the Office of the Clerk of Court of Granville County

The original is in the handwriting of the old statesman who signed the Declaration of Independence and the signature to this will is a facsimile of the immortal paper......

In systematizing the document in the Clerk's office, for ready references, Judge D.C. **HUNT**, Clerk of the Court, came across the last will and testament of John Penn, signer of the Declaration of Independence. The Public Ledger thanks Miss Jeannette **LONGMIRE**, deputy clerk for a true copy of the will as follows:

#### The Will

In the name of God, Amen. I, John PENN of the county of Granville and State of North Carolina, being of sound health do make and ordain this to be my last Will and Testament in manner and form following.

I give to my son William PENN all my lands to him his heirs and assigns forever. I also give to my son Orange, his wife and all the children she has or may have also my waiting man Sam.

I give to my daughter, Lucy **TAYLOR**, Rachell and all the children she may have at my death; my son and daughter greed to the following division, that Lucy should have Rachell and Phillis with their increase in lieu of those devised to William Penn.

It is my desire that at my death the negroes Col. John TAYLOR had of me, (thirteen besides Phillis and her increase), with their increase be valued and my son to have as many negroes allotted to him in value as what his sister has with their increase, exclusive of the above given to him. I think it but fair that as my son is older than his sister, and she having negroes and he none, that she should be charged with the increase of hers and she will derive an equal benefit with the increase of those I have with me, all the rest of my negroes besides those disposed of and those that are to be allotted to my son to make him equal with his sister, and to be equally divided between my two children, having regard to families as I would, by no means part husbands and wives and their children.

It is my desire that my daughter have one half of the money owing to me at my death. I also give to my daughter four horses or mares to be chosen in the following manner my son first to choose two, then my daughter two, then my son two, and then my daughter to choose four making her number six instead of four. I also give to my daughter thirty thousand pounds of Petersburg Tobacco as soon as it can be made or paid out of my son's estate without being obliged to sell.

All the rest and residue of my estate I give to my son to him his heirs and assigns forever.

It is my desire that if my son should die under age and without being married that my daughter have all my estate, that is devised to him which I give to her and her heirs forever. Also, if my daughter should die without having a child that all the estate that I now possess or hereafter acquire I give to my son and to his heirs, my meaning is that if I should have the misfortune to loose my daughter without having a child to live, that I do not intend to give Col **TAYLOR** any more of my estate than what he has got.

It is my desire that if Lucy should die leaving issue, then all the estate that I have devised to her should go to such issue.

In Witness Whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this first day of March 1784.

I appoint my son William **PENN** Executor to this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking all others by me made.

(Seal) JOHN PENN

This will is written by my own hand. If my daughter should leave issue and that issue should possess what I have willed above and should die before being married, it is my desire that my son-in-law Col. **TAYLOR** have what is given to his child or children if he be living but if he should be dead then my son William to have the estate thus given upon the death of such issue. March 5<sup>th</sup> 1784

#### JOHN PENN

April 10<sup>th</sup>, 1786, as I have made Col. **TAYLOR** sundrie presents, I do revoke that clause in my will giving him thirty thousand pounds of Tobacco and desire this to be taken as a Codicil to my will, one word in the third line blotted by myself.

#### Snapshots From the History of Granville

Oxford Public Ledger, April 3, 1936 Miss Jeanette E. Biggs

Of the 31 town in the United States named Oxford, only one is larger and incorporated earlier than Oxford, North Carolina, which is the best town in the Piedmont section of the state, being the oldest tobacco market in the Middle Belt of this excellent tobacco growing, farming section of the south. Granville County was formed in 1746, with Oxford as its County seat, incorporated in 1816 and has been always noted for its cultural and aristocratic atmosphere, for many years known as the 'Athens of North Carolina' on account of its many well known schools of learning.

Today it is the mecca of Masonry in North Carolina as the Oxford Masonic Orphanage, one of the largest orphanages for white children in the world, and the colored orphanage, the largest in the world, are situated in Oxford. Granville County is nationally known as the home place of John Penn, one of the three signers of the Declaration of Independence from North Carolina, situated on the Jefferson Davis highway north of Oxford.


Oxford is located on U.S. Highway 15 from Washington City to Florida and Highway 148.

Nine large warehouses are operated with double sets of buyers, thirty million pounds of tobacco being sold during present season, averaging highest prices given by the largest tobacco companies on the market. Excellent schools, modern hotels, handsome churches, unparalleled health conditions prevailing, make Oxford and Granville County most desirable places in which to visit and locate.

From Oxford take Hwy 158W thru Berea; turn right on Allensville Rd. (SR 1309); turn left on Gene Hobgood Rd. (SR 1310), a dirt dead end road; cemetery is at the end of the road on the left about 10 feet from the road.

I will bear faithfull and true Allegiance to the State of North Carolina and will truly endeavor to support, maintain, and defend the independent Government thereof against George the third, Kind of Great Britain and his successors, and the attempts of any other Person, Prince, power, state or Potentate, who by secret arts, treasons, Conspiracies or by open force shall attempt to subvert the same and will in every respect conduct myself as a peaceful orderly subject and that I will disclose and make known to the Governor, some member of the Council of State, some Justice of the Superior Courts or of the Peace, all treasons, Conspiracies and attempts committed or intended against the State which shall come to my knowledge.

And that all persons being quakers, Moravians, Menomists & dunkards & under the circomstances above mentioned in Law, shall make the following affirmation or depart the State.

I, A. B., do solemnly and sincerely declare and affirm that I will bear true Fidelity to the independent State of North Carolina and to the Powers & authorities which are or may be established for the good governments thereof and I do renounce any Fidelity to the present King of Great Britain, his Heirs and Successors, and that I will disclose and make known to the Governor, some member of the Council of State, Judge of the Superior Court or Justice of the peace, all Treasons, Conspiracies or attempts committed or intended against the same which shall come to my knowledge.

#### **Granville Public Roads**

Public Ledger, August 22, 1901

The roads of this county are changing from bad to worse. News reaches us from all sections that the roads are still in a terrible condition and in sections almost impassable. The heavy rains have made the roads in a worse condition than they would have been; but this condition has been brought about largely for want of work before and since the rains set in. We are informed that there is a place in a public road in Oak Hill township near the centre of the road in which a horse will almost disappear when he enters it. This ravine is about three feet deep, a kind of a high-land cave. In almost every direction the roads are in a terrible condition. Surely the overseers have forgotten the law on this point. If they do not heed our advice they will be very forcibly reminded of both ere long. Something must be done. The public should not be inconvenienced on account of the neglect of those who know their plain duty. There is too much at stake for this work to be neglected.
